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# Canada Cup renaissance

Welcome to the new-look, revamped, rejuvenated, Capital One Canada Cup of Curling, edition No. 9.

The Canadian Curling Association's initial venture into the realm of cash bonspiels began in 2003 at Kamloops. The first six events were staged there before moving to Yorkton in 2009 and on to Medicine Hat a year ago.

But additional stature has been granted the competition this season. In addition to reducing the field to seven men's and seven women's teams qualifying by way of last season's exploits, the winners will, for the first time, become the initial qualifiers for the 2013 Tim Hortons Roar Of the Rings Canadian Olympic trials slated for Winnipeg two years hence.

Total prize money for this shindig at the RecPlex has been reduced by \$10,000 to \$140,000. But six less teams will be in the money hunt. Winners will collect \$26,000, runners-up \$16,000, third-place finishers \$10,000 and, for the other eight teams, each win will be worth \$2,000.

Three of the seven following each round robin of six draws will advance to playoffs. Second and third finishers will collide in semi-finals with the round-robin leaders installed directly in the championship finals slated for Sunday

How important is a victory in this affair? Just about as important as it gets . . . at this stage of the races to become Team Canada in each gender at the Sochi Olympics.

For the also-rans, it will mean dropping back into the rigorous races for Canadian Team Ranking System points. There'll be as much point-hunting as buckhunting over the next two winters.

"It's massive," said defending men's champion Glenn Howard of Coldwater, Ont., on Tuesday. "I can't deny it. Obviously the long-term goal is to get to the Olympic trials and you don't want to give up any chances.



This is the first chance and if we can pull it off here then we don't have to worry about it for the next two years. Sure, if you don't win, you've got seven other chances, but it'd sure be nice to get it out of the way and enjoy the next couple of winters."

Following this event, the only routes to the trials proper will be next year's Canada Cup at Moose Jaw, a selection of points standings — this season, next season and a combination of the two, and a last-ditch pre-trials event in November, 2013 that will declare the final four teams, two men and two women, for the eight-team Sochi showdowns.

"It would be a nice bonus to be the first team into Winnipeg," said Winnipeg's Mike McEwen, the current World Tour money leader.

"It would bode well for promotional purposes. And, definitely it would be a nice feature for the team to win this one. We don't want to leave anything up in the air, we want to qualify straight in and as soon as possible.

"We don't want to see ourselves in a pre-trials, all-or- nothing situation again. We put a lot of emphasis on that."

That, in fact, is what happened to McEwen in 2009 at Prince George when he lost a last-gasp qualifier to fellow Winnipegger Jason Gunnlaugson.

With few exceptions, the game's top dogs are on hand at the Cranbrook icehouse. Many are fierce rivals including Howard and three-time Canada Cup champion Kevin Martin of Edmonton whose team of John Morris, Marc Kennedy and Ben Hebert won the gold medals at the Vancouver Olympics in February of 2010.

Then, too, there is four-time Canadian distaff champion Jennifer Jones of Winnipeg who missed making it five by a couple of inches last year at the Scotties in Charlottetown. That bauble went to Amber Holland of Kronau, near Regina, whose world silver medal winner is in the lists along with Saskatchewan rival Stefanie Lawton of Saskatoon, the Canada Cup defender and two-time champ.

"You don't think about Olympic trials," said Jones. "That's so far away. It's obviously something you'd like to get out the way but I don't think it matters whether you get it now or you get it later. The timing of it doesn't really matter.

"We're playing because we like to play. We're having fun. Obviously we'd like to go to the Olympics. I think every team playing the game would like to go to the Olympics. But if we don't . . . we'll still have fun along the way."

The event's only other twotime women's champ, Calgary's Shannon Kleibrink, joins the chase. Her crosstown rival skipped by Cheryl Bernard, the Olympic silver-medallist at Vancouver, is one of the few considered powerhouse units missing in action. Bernard fell one berth short of qualifying through last season's CTRS rankings.

The action starts today at 9 a.m., with Lawton facing Heather Nedohin of Edmonton and Ottawa's Rachel Homan testing Chelsea Carey of Winnipeg on the women's side, Howard tackling northern rival Brad Jacobs of Sault Ste. Marie and McEwen against 2010 Brier winner Kevin Koe of Edmonton.

World tour money-winning leader last year and again this season, McEwen, coincidentally, also entered last year's Canada Cup gauntlet with three early Tour victories under his belt.

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## CRANBROOK: A new look

Koe, who this season is aligned with Moose Jaw smoothie Pat Simmons at third, never has missed a Canada Cup renewal.

Rounding out the male contingent is Regina's Steve Laycock and defending Canadian and world champion Jeff Stoughton's Winnipeg team that includes Jon Mead, Reid Carruthers and Steve Gould.

For at least three of the current men's skips — Howard, 49, Stoughton, 48, and Martin, 45 — this 2014 shot at Olympic glory likely will be their respective last hurrahs. It figures that a win here would take a load of pressure off the shoulders of one of these elder skips.

"I like the system, I think they've definitely tweaked it for the best," said Howard. "And I know I don't have too many shots at the Olympics left in me so, yeah, there's a little bit of added pressure there."

Martin was of mixed minds Tuesday.

"There's two ways to look at winning that trials berth this early. Yeah, well take it if we win it, but that leaves you with two long seasons of trying to get up for a lot of other events and to maintain your momentum heading into the trials two years from now. Winning it now, it may be a lot tougher to sustain that competitive edge."

The Canada Cup remains the only cash bonspiel extant to continue with 10-end matches, start to finish. As such, for the first time this season, longer games will be the vogue for all of the competitors.

In 2 p.m. action today, Stoughton will play Jacobs and Martin tackles Laycock. In women's scuffling, Kleibrink plays Carey, Nedohin faces Jones and Holland opens against Lawton.

Round-robin action continues at 7 p.m. today, and 9, 2 and 7 on Thursday and Friday.

Tiebreakers, if required, will

be played Saturday at 8 a.m. followed by the TSN-televised women's semi-final at 1 p.m. and the men's televised semi at 6 p.m.

On Sunday, the women's televised final goes at 9 a.m. while the men's televised final starts at 1:30 p.m.

The event is presented by the St. Eugene Golf Resort Casino.

KEVIN MARTIN, Edmonton — There's something about Olympic gold medals and undefeated Brier streaks that stick in memory. The Old Bear can never be counted out when the pickings are this potent.

MIKE McEWEN, Winnipeg — This team has been getting better and better and better. A lot of people thought last season would constitute its time. This one could be it . . . in spades.

GLENN HOWARD, Coldwater — Came up big in last year's showdown and there's no doubt the team's capable of repeating the feat. Plus, getting the Trials business out of the way early would be a boon.

JEFF STOUGHTON, Winnipeg — Coming off his best
Brier-and-World combine ever.
Question is, will this team be able
to get back up to speed at this
early stage of the campaign.
May be slightly undertrained.

HEATHER NEDOHIN, Edmonton — Veteran former world junior queen is mounting a long and strong effort with a view to regaining her former level of success. The team is capable of surprise.

CHELSEA CAREY, Winnipeg

— Another young unit that set the curling world on fire a year ago. Trouble is, it has been having trouble repeating that success story

in the new season.

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# 'Like starting from scratch again'

It may be a brand new curling season for Amber Holland and her Canadian champs/world silver medallists who closed out the last one in grand style but, to this point, the re-boot has starkly resembled a lot of less-successful campaigns past.

Which is to say, anything but a walk in the winter park as the green-clad champs have expended copious energy ducking an assortment of spears and arrows aimed at bull's-eye targets newly-attached to their backs.

"A big target?" Holland repeats the question. "Oh, for sure. When you're the champs, nobody rolls over in front of you. If we want to win again, we're going to have to work for that.

"I've always felt that we've never taken the easy route and that teams have never handed us anything. We've always had to work hard to get where we wanted to be. So I don't think it's really all that different. We knew we'd have to step up our game, just to stay consistent with where we've been."

That's been a difficult assignment this time around. The team hasn't qualified for one cashspiel playoff round.

"What we don't seem to have figured out is how to make shots," she says. "I think the explanation is as simple as that. And that has to change. We haven't hit our stride yet, but that more or less normal at this stage. We need to go out there and make shots and do things right and the wins will take care of themselves.

"It's been different for us because we've never been in this position before. It's sort of like starting from scratch again. I think we're just feeling our way through it. We don't know how it's going to turn out.

"We took the opportunity to relax in the off-season but we knew there were a few things we were going to have to work on to get ready for this year. We've made some minor changes (technically) and we've been working hard on them. Just minor stuff we know we have to do a little bit better in order to be a little

more consistent."

How about a little elaboration there?

"Nope," she says with a laugh. There have to be some little secrets in the repertoire of a curling team, apparently.

"It's not the Tiger Woods thing, start from scratch and revise everything — we've worked on some of that but we've approached it like we always have," says the slender blonde skip who was raised in rural Dilke, northwest of Regina.

"We're looking at what worked for us and what didn't work for us and going on from there, whether that's on-the-ice technically and we're committed to some minor changes with a view toward more consistency, or whether it's psychologically where we've worked a lot with our mental trainer to talk about some of the things that we need to do better."

The defending Scotties champs suddenly were confronted last spring with a new-found notoriety. Some of it was enjoyable. Some of it wasn't.

"You play the game for so long and you go out there and do your things and whether the people notice you or don't notice you, whether someone wants to have a conversation with you, it is what it is, and it can be enjoyable," says Holland, the executive director of the Saskatchewan Curling Association when she's not throwing granite on ice.

"But sometimes you feel, 'look, I just want to go out there and curl and not worry about all the rest of the stuff that comes with what we did last year'.

"It's part of the game, though. The funny part of it is, you play



all your life to get there so when you get there you'd better enjoy it. Right? When it happens, I don't think a lot of people really understand the changes, all the people who come up and talk to you. It's OK, but it's just another thing we have to manage."

Some may have suspected a certain amount of team devastation setting in following the last end of the last game against Anette Norberg in Denmark.

"Confidence comes from playing well," says Holland. "OK, we didn't play that last end at the Worlds very well. So that's a learning experience and you take something from that and realize that's a place you don't want to go to and that just makes you stronger.

"A big thing for us is keeping the team unit together. It's the biggest thing, in fact. It's really easy for teams at that level to look at something like that and do the coulda-shoulda-woulda bit, but it doesn't really matter. We coulda-shoulda-woulda the last six or seven years together but the end result is still pretty good.

"The nicest thing is that we came back to Regina for the World men's and we were treated like royalty. I mean, everybody wanted a part of us, wanted our autographs, our picture. I think in our hearts we really had won the gold medal. Nobody came up to us and said, 'oh gosh, you kind of messed up that one'.

"You aren't going to win them all and we put ourselves in a tough position but we hung in there and we got through the tiebreaker and we got through the playoffs and we had to be proud of that because a lot of teams would have just folded up the tent and gone home.


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

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# HOLLAND: 'It's not how your start, it's how you finish'

"Being a first-time Team Canada, I'm pretty pleased, obviously. A lot of first-year teams before us didn't do as well. But we can only control what we can control."

So how about this new format Canada Cup format — rather than an automatic Olympic trials berth for winning the Scotties, she's here on the basis of the Scotties win and if she wins here she goes straight to the Olympic trials?

"The difference is that these teams are supposed to be the best of the best in the country, regardless of geography," she muses. "As soon as you regionalize and put a border on something you're not necessarily going to get the same strength of field.

"I mean, Alberta may have four of the top men's teams in the world and they can be in the Canada Cup where that could never happen at the Brier.

"As such, I don't mind this format. Seven teams is interesting, probably better than the two pools. I prefer the round robin when you're deciding something of this magnitude."

Is the new system totally fair, to players from Bonavista to Haida Gwai?

"If I played in Nova Scotia now I'd probably do what Brad Gushue does and sacrifice everything else in my life to curl more," says Holland. "We all have our burdens to bear and we all have our challenges with where we live and what we can access.

"Yes, it costs more for some than for others. But I like the idea of the trials process remaining consistent over a number of years. And if you've been working toward that, and have had consistent results, I like that process because I think it gets our better teams there.

"I like consistency in teams. I think that for the past few years the teams that have stayed together and played together have done Canada proud. Now, if you have to change, for whatever reason, you still have a couple of years to prove yourselves.

"I mean, you can say, 'oh yeah, Cheryl Bernard, her name looks good on paper we should put her right into the trials', but that's not the way our sport has ever worked. You have to go out on the ice and prove yourself every time.

"The fact that we have a couple of years to qualify for the Olympics is great. I mean, all of us go into our provincial playdowns and you have one shot. You lose, you're out. I think the nice thing about our sport is that we leave it on the ice. And a Cheryl Bernard or a Kevin Martin has to go out there and throw the rocks the same as everybody else."

Headed for role as Team Canada when the next Scotties rolls around in Red Deer, the Holland team will have to make do without defending its provincial title, always a momentum-builder.

"Well, we'll have the Continental Cup in January and we're looking forward to playing in that," says Holland. "Sure, it's a fun thing, but it keeps you on the arena ice.

"You won't get a lot of tough games, you won't get a lot of reps there. So we've committed to doing some training stuff. There aren't a lot of events that we can play in. We might be able to find a dress-up ladies' bonspiel somewhere in Saskatchewan. But this Canada Cup is probably our only shot at playing on arena ice until we get to the Scotties. We want to take advantage of that.






