Lawton, Lawes flawless after Day 1

One's in and one's out in terms of Olympic Trials qualifying but both authored double-win records on opening day at the Capital Cup Canada Cup on Wednesday at Mosaic Place.

Saskatoon's Stefanie Lawton, who has been scratching and clawing her way in the direction of a Trials berth for some years, walloped Ontario's Sherry Middaugh 10-4 and defending Canadian champion Heather Nedohin of Edmonton 8-5 on back-to-back draws.

The Kaitlyn Lawes-skipped Jennifer Jones aggregation, the defending Canada Cup champ from Winnipeg that already has qualified for the Trials, matched that output with a 9-7 conquest of Calgary's Crystal Webster backed by a 9-6 decision against Winnipeg rival Cathy Overton-Clapham, who just happens to be the vice-skip Lawes replaced a couple of seasons ago.

"Somebody's going to be happy here so why not us?" asked the 32-year-old Lawton.

"I think we're playing well, we've won two of the Slams, staying loose, enjoying events like this. That's where we want to be. It's good because you have to play against the top teams in Canada every time out.

"Overall I think we have more confidence this year." Added veteran vice-skip Sherry Anderson:

"Do we expect to be 8-and-0 this week? No. But we expect to play well every game and be in the groove. And if you win 'em, that's great, like today.

"We're up there, we're throwing them well, we all had draw weight and that's the main thing. You get a good feel the first day and we came out with two wins so there's nothing better than that."

The Lawes crew wasn't saying as much but, obviously, they were of a similar mind even if their goals may differ slightly.

"We're in a good spot," the 23-year-old Lawes

admitted. "It allows us to work on a few things. The only pressure we face is what we put on ourselves. We're just trying learn and get better and keep raising bars as best we can."

Having played the bonspiel circuit this fall without skip Jones, the team hardly has missed a beat.

"I've had a good skip to learn from,: said Lawes. "It's been a great experience, and I've had the best front end in the world working for me and throwing in front of me. That has made my job pretty easy."

That front end, of course, consists of Jill Officer and Dawn Askin.

Second Sherri Singler and the skip's sister, Marliese Kasner, round out the home-favoured Saskatchewan foursome of Lawton, a two-time Canada Cup champ. Teams directed by Nedohin, Webster and Middaugh bounced back for subsequent victories to finish the day at 1-1.

Nedohin drew a nibble of the four-foot Wednesday night to shaded Winnipeg's Chelsea Carey 9-7. Webster and Middaugh equalized in the afternoon, the Calgary team 7-4 against Carey and the Coldwater crew 8-5 over Overton-Clapham. The latter pair are winless heading into today's action.

Winnipeg men cream of the crop so far

A year ago, Mike McEwen sauntered into the Canada Cup at Cranbrook on the nation's hottest win streak and watched his whole season seemingly trickle away inside of a week.

So Wednesday's double on the victory side of the ledger at Mosaic Place was a pleasant experience for the Winnipeg skip and is unit of B.J. Neufeld, Matt Wozniak and Denni Neufeld.

"We feel really rested this week," said McEwen.

"I think this season was much better thought out and planned than in some other years. We've come in here dog tired before and played like it, too."

McEwen opened with an 8-2 afternoon thrashing of Brad Gushue's Newfoundlanders in a game that blew up when Gushue was flagged for a sixth-end hogline violation in a tie situation and the issue petered out from there. A few hours later, the Manitoban turned up the heat and socked world champion Glenn Howard of Coldwater, Ont., by a 7-6 count.


Keeping pace with McEwen at 2-and-0 was his crosstown Winnipeg nemesis Jeff Stoughton, the 2011 world champion, who whipped Howard 9-5 in the morning and rallied for a 7-5 duke against current CTRS points leader Kevin Koe of Calgary on the late shift.

"I don't know if we've ever won our first game here," McEwen, who has played in four renewals, said earlier. "That feels good. We know we're going to have to win four or five games to get into the playoffs. Every game looks like a feature game you could put on TV, so we've got to win as many as we can.

"It was a good first day. You're never going to have perfection on the first day. We got a big break in the first game."

Stoughton took his twin successes in stride.

"It was a struggle for both sides (in the morning)," he said. "There were some



uncharacteristic misses and some fantastic shots. So we just keep plugging away. We had some good shots at the right times."

The perennial Manitoba champ would like nothing better than to dispense with the suspense regarding the Trials berths.

"You want to get it over with," he admitted. "You don't want to keep watching the points, worrying about getting to the Brier, and, omigosh, I think it would relax us and maybe even give us a better chance of getting to the Brier."

Stoughton said his team is "going better".

"We felt we were average last year but when we looked it over we felt we weren't that bad. We have our drive and focus going right now for this event and I think we're just a little more consistent."

Koe, defending champion Kevin Martin of Edmonton and rookie John Epping of Toronto finished Day One at 1-1 while Howard and Brad Gushue of St. John's each lost twice.

Martin topped Gushue 10-7 in the evening after losing 7-6 to Epping on dawn patrol. Koe defeated Epping 5-3 in the afternoon with a deciding deuce in the eighth panel.

McEwen and Gushue were embroiled in a thriller until Gushue was called on a hogline violation in the sixth and McEwen was afforded a routine draw for a tiebreaking three-spot.

"I have to take the blame," said Gushue.

"I double-clutched and it cost us three points. That took the wind of our sails. Then we tried a shot for two because we didn't think one was enough and that didn't work, either. I just can't make the kind of mistakes I made there in the sixth end."

Epping tagged Martin with a four in the third end and Edmonton's Old Bear failed to fully recover although the issue was stretched to Epping's final stone.

"Scott (Epping third Bailey) made two beauties to set up that four," said Martin. "But to come right back with three (in the fourth) would have taken away their momentum. To get only one, that stung. Obviously we'd like to be playing better."



Skips weigh-in on Vegas deal

ith Canada Cup skips and other players this week, it's pretty well unanimous . . . and then some.

The plans to take the 2014 Continental Cup to Las Vegas was met with thumbs-up across the board.

So . . . what are they saying? . . .

Kevin Koe, Calgary skip:

"I think it'd be neat. It's good to see them trying new things. If they market it well I think it's got a chance. It'd be interested to see how it goes and it'd be fun to be part of it.

"We've been in the Continental Cup twice and it's fun to be part of the bigger team. We've made a lot of friends and it's a really fun event to play in. If we qualified for the Olympics we'd have to look at the timing and go from there.

"It'd be a great problem to have and, for sure, I'd like to have it."

Stefanie Lawton, Saskatoon skip:

"Oh-ho! Awesome! This is a whole reason in itself to win this thing, isn't it?

"It will keep you loose. Go there and have some fun. That's what curling's all about, right?

"I think it would be great. I mean, we travel all over the place to go curling and as long as there's ice, it doesn't matter where it is. I think Vegas could be a lot of fun, too. You'd just relax and have some fun and go swimming and go to the casino if that's what you'd like.

"So, yeah, the girls will be excited. Here there's definitely a lot of carrots dangling and that means more incentive to win this thing."

John Epping, Toronto skip:

"It's pretty exciting. How can you not be excited about the prospect of playing in a place like Vegas? I think it's a good idea if you can amp this sport up in the U.S. Hopefully that would be take this sport off even more down there if we could get the interest up . . . it's such a cool concept. Why wouldn't you want to go

to that city to help promote the game?

"For the Olympic team, it might not be a bad prep. A lot

of the other Olympic teams will be there. But you have to watch your body. Say you're a team that wins the pre-trials, then the Trials, then you have to go to the Continental Cup and then the Olympics. That's definitely a long road, so you'd have to think about taking part if you were that team."

Heather Nedohin, Edmonton skip:

"Let the chips fall. Team Nedohin would be all in for Vegas. I think with all the hype leading into the Russia Olympics a team would need some fun time . . . and so what a great opportunity would this be for a team to get away? Throw in some curling, for sure. Obviously there'll be some great curling. But, absolutely, if our team wins the Trials and goes straight to the Continental Cup in Vegas, there's no doubt that team is going to be thrilled.

"I think all of the teams here are anticipating that we're going to be the team that wins. And I think we're all going to be prepared to take time off from work and family to do what we need to do to prepare for Russia. So you throw in Vegas? I think it's great!

"We get sidetracked at the casino already. A team has to have some down time. I mean, we're athletes and we train in the gym and off the ice and there's some time where we want to entertain ourselves and go to put a little something on blackjack or whatever . . . "Absolutely, I think it would be fantastic. I mean, how entertaining is that? Curling in Vegas? I think it would be a high. I mean, they have the rodeo in Vegas so why wouldn't we want to bring curling down there? I think it's brilliant."

Kevin Martin, Edmonton skip:

"Any time an event is new and you're showing your sport to new people, it's a good thing. But from my personal point of view, when you go to an event and play, you see the room, you see the venue. I think the Continental Cup starts on a Thursday at 8 in the morning, ends at night . . it's long days.

"When I go to Vegas with my wife you go to have fun and watch shows. If you're playing in an event, your neighbours and friends and people in general say, 'man, that's got to be cool to go there and do that'. But you're really working, you're curling like crazy. There's no time for Vegas type fun no matter where you are.

"But, any time you go to somewhere new, it's good for the game, because you're showing it to a different audience. And that's important."

Kaitlyn Lawes, Winnipeg skip:

"It's interesting. Hopefully we'll be there, but I don't know what they'd do for the team that wins the Trials. It's kind of a grind. The teams that will be there will be some of the same European teams you'll see at the Olympics.

"But the Continental Cup is a ton of fun and I'd hate to miss it. I've never been to Vegas but I hear it's a fun place to be. I think it's good for the game, I hope they get publicity down there for it and I hope it doesn't get lost in all the excitement because I know there's a lot that goes on in Vegas.

"But I think if the U.S. can help promote it, get the TV networks involved, just something that shows some excitement . . . If we can can get more American curling the better. I mean, they have a huge population so if we can get more people involved in the sport I'm all for that."

Glenn Howard, Coldwater skip:

"It's fantastic. All of a sudden I want to go. I love the format, it's great, but to be honest with you it's not worth our while. To take a week off work to go and win \$1,000 in a week just doesn't make any sense to me. "That being said, the pride that goes along with it is fantastic and now that it is going to be in Vegas adds a little light to it. But they need to add more money. There just isn't enough money in it to justify taking time off work.

"I think it's kind of cool. I do like it. It twigged my interest a little more. Vegas has that aura about it. You put a curling event in the southern United States, are you kidding me, I think it would be well viewed.

"You go down there for a great time and people will have the chance to look at the this tricky sport on ice. I think people would love it. It'll add a little more spice and a little more life to the Continental Cup."

Crystal Webster, Calgary skip:

"I think it would be a ton of fun. I think it's exciting for the sport, the fact that we'd get to curl in Las Vegas. That's pretty crazy. I have no idea (who'd show up). They'll have to do a great job marketing it. But, absolutely, our team would love to be there.

"A couple of teams have been talking about it (going to the Olympics) and it would probably depend. I don't know the exact timing of all these events. It would be great to play in the Continental Cup but I think the Olympics still area foremost for everybody so we'll see how it all turns out."

Jeff Stoughton, Winnipeg skip:

"I think it's pretty cool. Maybe we won't have to watch all the games and we can enjoy some of the sights. I mean, you're at the rink from eight in the morning until late at night so we'll have to negotiate some time off to get a look at the surroundings, those of us lucky enough to go.

"It's a great idea and it'll be great for anybody who gets to go. We know that a lot of Canadians go down there in winter, for weekends, and this will be one more reason for them to go down there and scream and yell. "It'll be very interesting to see how the crowds would be. But it'll be a hoot."

Sherry Middaugh, Coldwater skip: "I think that's great. Fantastic,

actually, and a long time coming. The concept is great for the Continental Cup. It's just a little stagnant for the players. Kind of the same old. You think they needed to ramp it up a bit. I understand it had to be in Canada every year because it's the hotbed but hopefully this will grow the sport. "It'll be great for the players and hopefully the players will bring their wives (or husbands) and families. They don't make it easy but they had to do something and when I heard about it I thought it was a great concept.

"I think it would be a dilemma for the teams going to the Olympics — you can ask us when we go."

Brad Gushue, St. John's skip:

"Great. I think it'll be a lot of fun for whoever goes. Unless we win the Trials I don't think we'll be a part of it. Because we're pretty low in the CTRS. Even if we win here it's probably going to be the Brier winner. But I think it's exciting for the game.

"Hopefully it will grow the game. And it'll be a lot of fun for those who take part or just go down to watch it. There's a lot of fun at curling events, let alone in Vegas, so I think it's an exciting move.

"I think the team that wins the Trials would be silly not to go. You're still going to be on the ice, you're still going to be playing, you can still do your preparation down there, you might not take part in all the activities some of the other teams might but if we were fortunate enough to be that team I'd say there's a good chance we'd go.

Chelsea Carey Winnipeg skip:

"It's awesome. I really wanted to play in the Continental Cup before but now I want it even more when it's in Vegas.

"It's a really cool thing and good for them for moving it forward and being innovative and trying new things. I think it's really a novel idea."

Mike McEwen, Winnipeg skip:

"I thought, is this April Fool's Day? I thought, 'holy cow'. I think it was an idea hatched out of the U.S. and the WCF so why not go big, I guess. If we're going to make a splash and do something big before the Olympics I hope it works and I hope the media jumps all over it here and south of the border.

"The Olympic team's decision is a very god question, though. I wonder if the CCA would advise us to go or not. I think there'd be some serious discussions about planning in January to peak in February for the Olympics so there may be serious consideration as to what we should be playing and what we shouldn't.

"You know what? That'd be a great problem to have."

Cathy Overton-Clapham, Winnipeg skip:

"Isn't it exciting? Any time you can place an event in Vegas I think it's great for curling and great for everyone who's going to be there.

"I've never thought about the problem of winning the Trials and then going. I guess it'll be a great problem for anyone who goes but, for me, it's all about being there and I think it's great for our game."





Nedohin crew primed for Oly run

eather Nedohin's Scotties Tournament of Hearts champion unit from Edmonton has provided two very valuable and contradictory reminders this early curling season.

First of all, just because they're the reigning Scotties champions doesn't mean anything will be presented to them on a silver platter. The team has been hot and cold, and most every temperature in between, placing only 10th on the current campaign's Canadian Team Ranking System points standings as of the past weekend.

But, secondly, and perhaps more importantly, the gritty performance of Nedohin's team — third Beth Iskiw, second Jessica Mair, lead Laine Peters — at one October 'spiel, the Prestige Hotels and Resorts Classic in Vernon, B.C., was reminiscent of the team's surge to win the Scotties title last February in Red Deer.

Nedohin and Co., won six straight loser-out games in just over 24 hours in Vernon — three in a row on Saturday, three more on Sunday — and claimed its only World Curling Tour success of the season by beating Russia's Anna Sidorova in the final.

"We always say that we battle through the C-event as a team, and we don't necessarily get too daunted once we get down there," said Iskiw, a Truro, Nova Scotia product whose resume includes a Canadian junior title with skip Meredith (Doyle) Harrison.

"We trained hard through the summer, and that's where we thought, well, let's see how this all pays off. So we had the three on Saturday and three more on Sunday, and we still felt great at the end of it."

Nedohin's crew, along with Winnipeg's Jennifer Jones, already has claimed a berth in the 2013 Tim Hortons Olympic Trials at Winnipeg, so this season is more about fine-tuning than about chasing Trials qualifying points.

"All this season, we're trying to simulate as much as we can for the Trials, for bigger and better things," said Iskiw. "That was the great thing about qualifying early — all of this season is about trying things out to find out the things we need to do to prepare for next season so that we really know ourselves as a team. This whole year and into next year is all about the journey of trying to figure out how we can be at our best for December (2013 Trials) and February (2014, in Sochi, Russia) of next season."

But as its performance in Vernon proved, Nedohin's team, which won bronze at the Ford world women's championship last March in Lethbridge, is still putting a high premium on winning and staying at a high level in the country's most competitive women's curling province.

"That's the thing with curling in Alberta," said Iskiw, whose team will attempt to defend its Scotties title in February in Kingston, Ont., as Team Canada.

"Holy smokes, every time we go out and play a game, everybody is so good. You don't necessarily feel that you're better than anybody else. Yes, we won a fantastic title, and that was great. But this is a new season, and everybody's really good.

We have to make sure we're staying on top of everything and getting better."

Nedohin's goals may have seemed pretty lofty last season. The foursome was seeded No. 5 heading into the 12-team Alberta championship.

Then something magical happened. After flying under the radar all year, they got hot at the right time.

"Planned it just right, huh?" said Nedohin with a smile.

To get back to the international stage, whether it be the Worlds or the Olympics, the team still seeks consistency.

Canadian women have not been as dominant as the men on the international stage, as witnessed by the fact that seven of the top 20 women's teams in the world are from outside Canada.

Canada has been shut out of a Worlds gold since Jennifer Jones won it in 2008 at Vernon.

In that sense, there is a bigger picture at play.

"There's no way we're going to be letting down," said Nedohin. "Honestly, in the world standings, Canada hasn't won the gold for a while and we have to step up to what they're stepping up to.

"All of us Canadian teams are working hard to stay on top because internationally, we know they are. There's no doubt, any one of us that has the opportunity to represent Canada at the Olympics, we want to be coming home with gold.

"Darryl (coach Horne) has definitely shaped us to where we want to be in preparation for 2014. We had some great opportunities over the summer to reflect back, to see how our season went and to reflect over the last couple of years to see the growth of the team. It's a complete bonus to have all four of us intact and playing the whole season."

Last season's achievement has placed a different type of pressure on the foursome, which gained a lot of confidence during its run.

"It's exciting times for us because we have lots of room to improve and we have the timeline to do it," said Nedohin.

"The pressure is always on. Canadian teams are always strong. You can't have a lackadaisical year and hold back. We're always pushing ourselves to be better. We battle out there most games.

"There's no opportunity for us to let our game down whatsoever. We've got to maintain sharpness as a solid unit."

Iskiw, for one, is ready for the tough road ahead. Her setup performances last year helped her confidence soar.

"We still have a lot of the same goals we did last year," said Iskiw. "We achieved goals we all worked hard toward but now we want to build on that. We feel as a team we're energized and we're really encouraged by our experience last year.

"It will always be great to look back on, a great experience as a team. We had a lot of ups and downs and we learned from that . . ."

Those ups and downs continue in terms of results. Not so much in terms of confidence born of the fact this team knows it can produce success.

Saskatoon's Stefanie Lawton is shooting to become the first three-time women's champion at the 2012 Capital One Canada Cup with previous event titles in 2008 and 2010. urlers are people, too...social animals, of course, and as such, as apt to join the social media universe as anyone else.

As a curling journalist, social networking is an invaluable tool. Via Twitter, Facebook and team pages, your correspondent has instant access to records, stats, schedules, team updates, and, in fact, the players themselves.

With busy schedules all-round, gone are the days you bang your head on the wall because you missed the interview you wanted when the player in question had to hit the shuttle and slipped by you.

Voila! A Facebook or Twitter message and you have the answer to the question.

But it's not just about the curling, it's about people and socializing. It's one of the things that makes curling so special. You are just as likely to get an update about a baby's first step, picture with Santa, or that summer snap with the big fish that didn't get away, as you are about curling.



In that respect, as new and sometimes intimidating as social media can be, the future truly reflects the roots of a sport and why it is so special: It's about being social.

Over the course of the week, we will be talking to Canada's elite curlers and getting their take on social media and why it is important – or not – to them.

Certainly, better sponsor exposure, updated team information, and quality images make all sorts of sense in growing the game not just in Canada but around the world (and so many Canadian Facebook curlers are friends with their global counterparts as well).

Media covering the frozen sheet are quite aggressive in this respect as well, meaning there aren't many results out there that aren't quickly accessible.

To continue to grow the game globally, it's a natural progression – technical or otherwise.

In fact, you – the fan – have a much better opportunity to be connected with elite athletes via social media than stars in most other sports.

That's the beauty of curling.

Remembering Bobby Corman

Saskatchewan curling ambassador dead at 84

One of Saskatchewan's greatest-ever curling boulevardiers is missing from the scene this month.

Eighty-four-year-old Bobby Corman of Assiniboia died of heart failure following a difficult battle with cancer on Nov. 15.

He was an ardent curling fan who attended and celebrated 37 Briers and 31 world championships, along with virtually any rock-tossing event of significance in the province.

Her was, literally, 'a fan for all seasons' according to Regina Leader-Post sports columnist Rob Vanstone

A life-long farmer, Corman's exploits were legendary and his friends were legion.

"A stranger," he used to say, "is a friend I haven't met."

He knew them all in Saskatchewan's curling rinks. He always was dropping in unannounced at local clubs and those more distant where bonspiels were under way. His closest friends say he was totally obsessed with the sport.

Earlier this year, the Saskatchewan Curling Association awarded Corman an honourary life membership.

Back in 2005, the province awarded him the Commemorative Medal for the Centennial of Saskatchewan for his contribution to the development of farming and his support of curling.

His affection for the roarin' game dated back to 1949 when a neighbour built a curling rink on a farm that was located six kilometres away in the Zenith/Davyroyd district.

Corman attended his first Brier in 1955 at Regina's Exhibition Stadium. He watched the undefeated Garnet Campbell-skipped team from Avonlea win the province's first Brier title.


His most rewarding curling-related experience, wrote Vanstone, is not documented in any of the game's annals.

"On one wintry day, when the road conditions were treacherous on the route from Corman's farm to the curling rink, he decided to travel to the venue on horseback.

"On the way, he stopped to warm up at a schoolhouse at which the lone teacher worked and resided. And he made a point of paying a return visit after completing his curling obligations for the day.

"The teacher, Norma Thorsness, became Norma Corman 61 years ago. She, too, endeared herself to the sporting community — including the "bodyguards" and others in the vicinity of Sections 26 and 27 at Mosaic Stadium, home of the Saskatchewan Roughriders.

Corman was a season's ticketholder every year since the Roughriders became a provincial entity. He first became a subscriber in 1948, the year in which the Regina Roughriders were renamed with a provincial emphasis. He remained a fixture at Mosaic Stadium through the final home game

of the 2012 Canadian Football League campaign. He was no less a stranger at the football yard than in the curling rinks.

On one wintry day, when the road conditions were treacherous on the route from Corman's farm to the curling rink, he decided to travel to the venue on horseback.... On the way, he stopped to warm up at a schoolhouse at which the lone teacher worked and resided... the teacher, Norma Thorsness, became Norma Corman 61 years ago. She, too, endeared herself to the sporting community."

When word got out that Corman was fighting cancer, his friends quickly rallied around him. A football, autographed by the Roughriders, was delivered to his farm near Assiniboia.

He was overwhelmed by the response, and undaunted by the disease and travelled to Winnipeg on the first weekend of November for the Canadian Football Hall of Fame inductions as a guest of former Roughriders guard Jack Abendschan, who was among the 2012 inductees.

Abendschan, a California native, became a Corman family friend shortly after joining the Roughriders in 1965.

Bobby Corman was born on June 18, 1928 on the farm 12 miles east of Assiniboia. He farmed all his life and, this past harvest, "ran his trusty 1480 to bring in a bumper crop of durum wheat".

He is survived by his wife Norma; five children: Guy (Nadine), June (Harald) Ensslen, Anne (Chris) Duffy, Trace, and Bill (Darlene); seven grandchildren: Justin, Tess, Shai, Daniel, Christine, Cady and Mick, one greatgranddaughter Mina; two sisters, Ferne Lindeburg and Shirley Mossop, in-laws Ethel Corman and Shirley Corman, as well as numerous nieces and nephews.

He was predeceased by infant son Don, parents Henry and Mary (Stewart) Corman, three sisters Jean Corman, Doris Allen and Nan Corman, and three brothers Ronnie, Harold (Bub) and Edward (Teddy).

He also is survived by a host of friends in curling clubs all across Saskatchewan.



Kamloops gets nod for 2014 Brier

The City of Kamloops has been awarded the 2014 Tim Hortons Brier venue.

The 85th edition of the Canadian men's curling championship will be played March 1-9 at the Interior Savings Centre. It will mark the second time that Kamloops has hosted the Brier, after staging the 1996 renewal won by Manitoba's Jeff Stoughton, who stole the victory against Alberta's Kevin Martin in an extra end in one of the most exciting finals in history.

It also will mark just the seventh time that British Columbia has hosted the Brier since the championship began in 1927 in Toronto.

"The year 2014 is stacking up to be an incredible Olympic year with some very unique championship locations and events

being hosted by the CCA," said CEO Greg Stremlaw.

There also will be some new wrinkles introduced to the 2014 Tim Hortons Brier format.


The winning team will become Team Canada and receive an automatic entry into the 2015 Brier.

As well, an as-yet-to-be-determined number of provinces/territories, based on the results of the 2014 event, will play a relegation round immediately prior to the 2015 Brier, in order to determine which ones qualify for the 12-team draw.

Tim Hortons began its title sponsorship of the Brier in 2005 in Edmonton and has extended its agreement through 2014.

Tickets for the 2014 Brier are expected to go on sale in February of 2013. The winning team will then represent Canada at the World men's curling championship at a site and date to be announced by the World Curling Federation.

In addition to the 1996 Brier, Kamloops also staged the Canada Cup

competition from its inception in 2003 through 2008 and the 1998 Ford World Curling Championships, won by Canada's Wayne Middaugh and Sweden's Elisabet Gustafson

The Brier will be televised exclusively and extensively in Canada by TSN and RDS, from the round robin, through the Page Playoffs, semi-final, bronze-medal and gold-medal

"In 2014, Tim Hortons will proudly celebrate its 10th year as title sponsor of the Brier," said

Bill Moir, chief brand and marketing officer, Tim Hortons.

"Each year we look forward to the excitement the Brier ignites in Canadians. We join them in anticipation of another great event."

When Kamloops hosted the 1996 Labatt Brier, 127,746 fans attended. In 1998, the attendance for the Ford Worlds was 93,530. The Interior Savings Centre, home of the Kamloops Blazers major junior hockey team, seats approximately 6,000.

The Brier has been played in 31 cities across Canada, from Victoria to St. John's. Manitoba has won a leading 27 Briers. Alberta is next with 25 victories, followed by Ontario with 10 after Glenn Howard's win last season in Saskatoon.

Saskatchewan has produced seven Brier winners while Northern Ontario and British Columbia have sent four title winners, Nova Scotia three, Quebec two and Newfoundland/Labrador one. New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Yukon/Northwest Territories have yet to win.
