MEDIA INFORMATION

ACCREDITATION

Accreditation can be picked up at the accreditation desk, located on Level 2 (Curling Lounge & Arena Entrance).

All media badges issued for this event are non-transferable. Failure to follow this rule will result in forfeiture of your media credential.

MEDIA BENCH

An event/media area has been set up at the home end of the concourse. The bench offers wireless Internet, electrical outlets and TV's. Overflow media seating is available on the Suite Level in the media box (located on Sheet D side of building).

MEDIA WORKROOM

A media workroom is set up on the lower level on the southeast side of the building.

Saturday through to the conclusion of the event it will open 30 minutes before the first draw of the day and close roughly one hour after the last draw.

The media room has electrical outlets, wireless Internet, a printer and television to assist in the production and distribution of media materials and media services.

INTERVIEW REGULATIONS/PROCEDURES

You will be required to fill out interview request forms, which will be available on the media bench. The forms will be gathered by volunteers as the draw progresses and will be handed to requested players at the completion of their games.

All post-game media interviews will be conducted in a physically-distanced scrum format at ice level in a designated space adjacent to the media bench. All players have been instructed to exit through this area on their way to the dressing rooms. Every effort will be made to escort players to the specified area as quickly as possible after each draw.

TV NON-RIGHTS HOLDERS

TSN/World Curling TV are the sole TV rights-holder for this event. However, in order to provide other stations and/or networks with an opportunity to get brief game/highlight footage, broadcast media may **air two minutes of game footage daily in Canada from TSN,** and must provide credit to TSN.

For international media, no more than 90 (ninety) seconds per day for usage in any news and/or sports news programme. Usage permitted on all platforms of broadcasters (digital, web, social) as long as geo-blocked. Should be used within a period of 72 hours. No Archive. Credit must be provided to World Curling TV.

TV non-rights holders may use as much post-game media scrum footage as they wish.

No live hits, stand-ups or recording of non-broadcast games will be allowed to occur inside the venue.

WORLD CURLING PHOTOGRAPHY GUIDELINES

PHOTOGRAPHERS REGULATIONS & CODE OF CONDUCT ALL PHOTOGRAPHERS MUST BE IDENTIFIED WITH AN APPROPRIATE MEDIA ACCREDITATION – FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH THESE REGULATIONS MAY RESULT IN THE IMMEDIATE WITHDRAWAL OF YOUR MEDIA ACCREDITATION.

These regulations have been put in place by World Curling in order to ensure the smooth operation of photographers accredited for events.

GENERALLY, PHOTOGRAPHERS ARE ALLOWED ONTO THE FIELD OF PLAY (FoP) DURING CURLING CHAMPIONSHIPS AND CAN SHOOT FROM:

- Anywhere between the hoglines on the carpeted areas separating the sheets of ice
- The corners of the arena
- Behind the sheets of ice, in between the scoreboards, but not directly in front of or behind the scoreboards
- Please pay particularly close attention to rules 4, 8 and 9 on page 4

In all cases, this is provided that you are not obscuring the vision of spectators, blocking the scoreboard, in the way of the players or are a particular visual distraction to the World Curling host broadcaster, World Curling TV (WCTV) or Rights-Holding TV Broadcasters (RHBs).



PHOTOGRAPHING A CURLING CHAMPIONSHIP -THINGS TO WATCH FOR:

COMPETITION

Team names are posted on the scoreboards.

PRE-GAME ACTION

Prior to the start of each draw (round of games), each team receives practice time on the sheet of ice they will be competing on, usually starting 30 minutes before game time. The final minutes before the official start of competition are used for team introductions and final preparation of the ice.

• FIELD OF PLAY (FoP) PERSONNEL

Will try not to obstruct your sightlines. However, they must move to perform their duties and will occasionally interfere with your photography.

A GAME OF CURLING

A game usually last ten (10) ends. An 'end' usually lasts 15 minutes. The action goes down and back, from one end of the sheet to the other, hence the name 'ends'. Games going to'10 ends' will finish at the 'home end'. However, teams can concede at any point after six ends in round-robin games and eight ends in play-off and medal games. Watch the scoreboard and if a team is losing badly look for players shaking hands and conceding the game early after the last stones have been delivered in an end.

LAST STONES MAY NOT BE DELIVERED


If a team needs two points to win, and has no stones in scoring position with only one stone remaining to play, the game will end without last stones being delivered.




KEY PHOTOGRAPHY RULES

- 1. Flash photography is not allowed at any time.
- 2. Please turn your mobile/cell phone off before entering the FoP. Silent or vibrate settings are permitted.
- 3. You are not allowed on the ice surface at any time.
- 4. You are requested to wear dark clothing and to wear shoes that have only been worn indoors or shoe covers whilst at work on the FoP. Failure to do so will result in being denied access to the Field of Play and the possibility of accreditation being revoked.
- Please photograph from a sitting/squatting position. Move along the walkway at appropriate intervals in order not to consistently block the view of the same spectators.
- 6. Leave camera bags and non-essential bulky equipment outside the FoP.
- 7. Always walk, do not run inside the FoP.
- 8. When preparing to move either along a walkway or across the end of a sheet remember that other games may be going on at the same time make sure to look down both adjacent sheets to ensure that no player is in the process of delivery. If one is, then please await the completion of the delivery before moving. When crossing the end, cross behind the scoreboard, not in front. Please be mindful of any WCTV or RHB camera, which may also be on the same walkway.
- If the game you are photographing is being covered by TV please ensure you photograph from the same walkway as the WCTV cameras, not the opposite walkway. Please sit alongside the TV camera tripod to stay out of the TV shots.

- When a player is about to deliver a stone, you must be behind him/her or between the hog lines.
- Please be aware that the WCTV or RHB cameras may move along a walkway or to a different walkway during any draw. Please cooperate with any request regarding the moving of cables, cameras, etc.
- 12. For the semi-final and final, special instructions will be issued on photography locations. Only one photographer per affiliation will be allowed onto the carpeted area/walkway designated for photographers located adjacent to the game sheet. All other photographers from the same affiliation must position themselves on a non-adjacent walkway behind or to the side of the playing area. Certain photographers may also be allowed a key position behind the scoreboard.
- Photography instructions regarding the presentation of the championship trophy will be issued prior to the final.
- 14. For certain events an armband policy for access to the FoP may be implemented.





TV NON-RIGHTS HOLDERS (CANADIAN MEDIA)

TSN is the sole Canadian TV rights-holder for the 2025 BKT World Men's Curling Championship, thus no cameras/portable video devices from any other media affiliation are allowed **inside** the boards during morning, afternoon and evening draws.

However, in order to provide other stations and/or networks with an opportunity to get brief game/highlight footage, approved camera positions will be available at certain locations **outside** the boards around the perimeter or at various places on the concourse level or press box, provided your position at no time blocks the view of spectators nor presents a fire access hazard. **Please ensure that your camera has no visible logo. If so, please cover it up.**

You are allowed to air two minutes of game footage daily, provided the game footage is not from a game being televised as the feature game by TSN, in which case you must use their highlights with the appropriate credit.

The main media scrum takes place at ice level near the media bench. There will be an appropriate backdrop/signage noting the area. All players will pass by this area en route to their dressing rooms.

TV cameras must allow the media scrum to first interview any requested players before arranging individual interviews. However, cameras may be part of any scrum. For TV non rights-holders, you are allowed to air as much footage from the scrums as you wish.

When all games have been completed for any draw **AND** when TSN/World Curling TV has concluded its telecast and is off the air, you are allowed to do 'stand-ups' or interviews at ice level on the carpeted areas, near the scoreboards or even inside the boards, provided you are not disrupting the ice technicians as they prepare the surface for the next draw.

For brief live hits, if TSN/World Curling TV is not on the air, you will be able to do stand-ups on the concourse, seating areas, etc., providing any lighting requirements have been pre-approved. When TSN/World Curling TV is on the air, NO live hits are allowed.

OFFICIAL NAME:	BKT World Men's Curling Championship
DATE/SITE:	March 29 - April 6, 2025 - Temple Gardens Centre, Moose Jaw, Sask.
SEATING CAPACITY:	4,244
FORMAT:	Thirteen teams compete in a 12-game round robin. The top two teams in the standings advance directly to the semifinals. The third through sixth ranked teams compete in qualification games (3 vs. 6; 4 vs. 5) with the winners advancing to the semifinals. The semifinal winners play in the gold-medal game and the losers play for bronze.
	No tiebreakers will be played, so ties for playoff spots are to be broken based on head-to-head results, and if that doesn't resolve the tie, then the pre-game Last-Shot Draw distances will be used.
INTERNET:	Draw results and event information can be obtained at: https://www.curling.ca/2025worldmen/
TELEVISION:	TSN, RDS2 (All draws) / World Curling TV
HOW TEAMS QUALIFIED:	Five nations from the Pan Continental Zone and eight nations from the European Zone qualify for the 13-team field at the world championship. The host nation receives an automatic berth into the event, which reduces the number of qualifying teams in the zone of the host nation.
	For example, four teams (instead of five) qualified in the Pan Continental Zone because Canada received its spot as the host nation.

NO-TICK ZONE:	If prior to the delivery of the sixth stone of an end, the delivered stone causes - either directly or indirectly - an opposition stone in the Free Guard Zone (FGZ) which is touching the centre line to be moved to an off-centre position, to a position outside the FGZ or out of play, the non- offending team has the option to:
	1. Remove the delivered stone from play and replace all stones that were displaced to their positions prior to the violation taking place, or;
	2. leave all stones where they came to rest.

GAME DURATION:	Ten ends are scheduled with extra end(s) to break tied games. A minimum of eight (8) must completed in the play-off games, in any other games a minimum of six (6) ends must be completed.
GAME TIMING:	Thinking time will be used for this event. Each team receives 38 minutes to complete a ten-end game. Extra ends will be four minutes and 30 second (4:30) of thinking time for each team. A team's clock begins:
	 Once the opposing team has completed their shot, all rocks have come to rest and moved behind the back line; AND the opposing team's sweepers have moved to the side of the sheet; AND the opposition in charge of the house has relinquished control of the house; AND the person in charge of the house (the delivering team) has taken control of the house. A team's game clock stops once the stone has reached the nearest tee-line at the delivery end.
TIMEOUTS:	Each team is allotted one, 60-second timeout (plus travel time). The timeout must be signaled to the umpire and time clock operator. Either a coach OR alternate may attend the timeout, but not both. A translator may also attend if required.
	The fifth-end break will be five minutes.
	Both teams will receive one 60-second timeout to play in any extra end during that game.
LAST STONE DRAW (LSD):	The team listed first in the draw schedule for the round robin games will play the stones with the dark- coloured handles; the team listed second will play with the stones with the light coloured handles.
	For games requiring Last Stone Draws (LSD), at the conclusion of each team's pre-game practice, two stones will be delivered to the tee at the home end, by different players – the first stone with a clockwise and the second with a counter-clockwise rotation. A player (alternate) that delivers or sweeps an LSD stone does not have to play in that game. Sweeping is allowed.
	The first stone will be measured and removed from play before the second stone is delivered. The distances recorded for each stone will be added together to give the team its LSD total for that game. The team with the lesser LSD total will have the choice of delivering the first or second stone in the first end of that game. If the LSD totals for both teams are the same, the individual LSD stones are compared and the best non-equal LSD has the choice of delivering first or second stone in the first end. When both teams have the exact same individual LSD stone distances, a coin toss will be used to determine that choice.
PLAYOFF GAMES, Stone Selection & Last stone advantage:	When round robin play (one group) is used at World Curing competitions, with each competing team playing all other teams, stone colour and first stone in the first end of post round robin games is determined as follows:
	(i) The team with the better win/loss record has the choice of stone colour and playing first or second stone in the first end.(ii) If the teams have the same win/loss record, the winner of their round robin game has the choice of stone colour or playing first or second stone in the first end.



AWARDS Collie Campbell Memorial Award

The **Collie Campbell Memorial Award** was created in honour of Canadian Collie Campbell who served as President of the International Curling Federation (later renamed the World Curling Federation) from 1969 to his death in 1978.

The award is a fitting memorial as the wording on the original plaque says:

"Presented annually to the player selected by his fellow competitors in the World Curling Championship for the Air Canada Silver Broom who best exemplifies the traditional curling values of gentlemanly skill, fair play and sportsmanship that Collie Campbell strove to perpetuate as a curler and as president of the International Curling Federation (1969-1978)."

Good sportsmanship was important to Campbell. He always said "Curlers do not need an umpire or a referee or rules. They govern themselves as gentlemen."

He was a man of many talents, abilities and interests. His chosen profession was that of Mining Engineer. In the 1930s he became one of the youngest members of Parliament in the Federal Government of Canada. Asked to join the Provincial Government of Ontario, he held the post of Minister of Mines, Energy and Resources. When war was declared in 1939 he immediately signed up and, because of his expertise and contacts with miners, was put in charge of forming the tunnelling company of the Royal Canadian Engineers. Over the course of the next six years, until the end of the Second World War, he distinguished himself well by rising to the rank of Brigadier General and received the Distinguished Service Order (DSO), the Order of the British Empire (OBE) and other honours from Britain, France and the United States. Most of his leaves were spent in Scotland 'Bonspieling'. The curling contacts he made at the time were invaluable to him, particularly for his tenure as President of the Canadian Curling Association (1947-1948) and later for his work as President of the International Curling Federation when he transformed the Scotch Cup into the World Curling Championships.
